#### **Dog Obedience**

Mary Morris

This class is for dogs 4 months and older and all skill levels. Dogs must be up-to-date on Rabies/ DHLP vaccinations. Kennel Cough vaccination is strongly suggested. For younger dogs the emphasis of this class will be on socialization with people and other dogs, along with obedience work. For older more experienced dogs, the emphasis will be on gaining more control and polishing obedience skills: heel off leash, sit, stand, down, stay and come when called. Information will be offered on continued training, training aids, and problemsolving solutions for difficult behaviors.

Dog obedience training is a continuous process. Plan on spending 15-20 minutes each day working with your pet to gain maximum benefit from this class. Participant must be physically able to walk and control dog during the class. Dog must wear a collar (no harnesses) with a 6 foot leather or web/ nylon leash (no chain or flexi leashes). Bring soft training treats and a chair. A parent must attend class with youth trainers under the age of 14.

quilt block. They are comprised of simple geometric shapes and are painted in bright colors, in the same patterns found in handmade quilts.



You are your child's first and most important teacher! ECFE classes support you in this essential role. ECFE classes are designed for you and your child and is unique to Minnesota and is a program of the Breckenridge Public School's Community Education. Registration for ECFE classes is ongoing. You are welcome to join our classes anytime during the school year, space permitting. Residents from Breckenridge, Wahpeton and other communities are welcome!

#### Sliding Fees and Scholarships Available for Breckenridge School District Residents

If your budget is too tight to allow for an ECFE class, call Laura at (218) 643-6822 to learn more about our sliding fee scale and scholarship program.

**Location:** Classes are held in the ECFE Center of the Breckenridge Elementary School unless otherwise indicated.

**Class Fees:** Class fees are indicated with each class description and are payable upon registration. When registering two children for the same ECFE class, pay half the fee for the second child aged one year and over for classes meeting more than one time. No family who resides in the district will be denied participation because of inability to pay.



# The components of most ECFE classes are:

**Growing Together:** For You and Your Child: Half of each class is devoted to activities planned by a licensed early childhood teacher for parents and children to explore together. Together you can enjoy learning through art, music, stories and a variety of developmental activities. It is an opportunity to learn new ideas, games and activities that you can do at home.

**Growing Independently:** For Your Child: The remaining portion of each class is for children to have fun learning through play using art, movement, games and stories with the licensed early childhood teacher, the classroom assistant and the other children. New friendships are formed and children discover aspects of "me" while they learn apart from you. The goal of the children's program is to develop a healthy self-concept and a joy of learning.

**Growing Confidently – For You:** While children take part in the children's program, parents join with other parents in an informal group setting for discussion time led by a licensed parent educator. Being a parent is enjoyable, complex, and at times, stressful. Parents have the opportunity to choose and discuss current family topics, share ideas and concerns and feel encouraged by the support of others.







7-12 Principal, Breckenridge High School The start of the 2021-2022 school year is quickly approaching. We are excited to get back to school and back to building relationships with you and your student.

We are still dealing with COVID-19. Our community, nation and school experiences are changing due to this pandemic. Breckenridge needs to adapt and pivot with the many new ideas and education practices learned last year. Our plan is to be on campus for the 2021-2022 school year.

Our focus for the 2021-22 school year is to continue PBL. We are in year five of our project based-learning educational change.

We are now asking our public to be active participants. It takes a village to create culture. It takes adults in the community to "buy into" the vision and mission of the school. We as adults need to set the culture and expectations. Be intentional about your relationships and how vou treat people.

#### 2021/2022 Modified-Block Schedule:

We are going to a modified-block schedule. A modified-block schedule is a 5-6 period day of some classes being 50 minutes and some classes being 90 minute class periods with students and staff having 5-6 classes



per semester. We made this change as we felt our course schedule from the last two years could "mold" together.

2. Continued agreement with NDSCS: Our students have the opportunity to take college classes at NDSCS in welding, agriculture, diesel mechanics, HVAC, culinary arts and many more courses. We at Breckenridge are excited to partner with NDSCS and continue a long-lasting relationship with our neighboring higher education institution.

#### Asbestos Notification

Our school buildings have been inspected for asbestos under the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act of 1986 (AHERA). Some asbestos-containing building materials (ACBM) have been submitted to the Minnesota Department of Families, Children and Learning (MDFCL), and the report is available for your inspection in the Superintendent's Office at the Breckenridge Elementary School. The District Ôffice is designated as Asbestos Program Manager for our district and can be reached at 218-643-6822. Problem areas in these buildings are outlined in the Management Plan, available at the Breckenridge High School. Anyone interested in review-ing the information should contact the District Office. Re-inspection takes place every July and December. Red warning labels have been attached to ACBM only in routine maintenance areas such as the furnace room. Please heed these labels, and do not allow them to be removed or replaced. Asbestos-containing areas will be kept under surveillance for change or damage. If you notice any change or damage to areas identified as asbestos-containing, please notify the Asbestos Program Manager above at once. In addition to periodic surveillance (at least every 6 months), the school will be re-inspected by a certified asbestos inspector every three years.

If you have questions or concerns about potentially asbestos-containing materials in the District, contact the District Office, Asbestos Program Manager.

#### Notice Concerning Use of Pest Control Materials

A Minnesota state law went into effect in year 2000 that requires schools to inform parents and guardians if they apply certain pesticides on school property. Specifically, this law requires schools that apply these pesticides to maintain an estimated schedule of pesticide applications and to make the schedule available to parents and guardians for review or copying. State law also requires that you be told that the long-term health effects on children from the application of such pesticides or the class of chemicals to which they belong may not be fully understood. An estimated schedule of pesticide applications is available at the Breckenridge High School, Elementary School. Parents of students may request to receive, at their expense, prior notifica-tion of pesticide application made on days other than those specified in the estimated schedule. Policy 404 Employment & Services Criminal History Background Checks - Notice to Parents/Guardians The school district has adopted a policy, the purpose of which is to promote the physical, social, and psychological well-being of its students. Pursuant to this policy, the school district shall seek criminal history background checks for all applicants who receive an offer of employment with the school district. The school district also shall seek criminal history background checks for all individuals, except enrolled student volunteers, who are offered the opportunity

to provide athletic coaching services or other extracurricular academic coaching services to the school district, regardless of whether compensation is paid. These positions include, but are not limited to, all athletic coaches, extracurricular academic coaches, assistants, advisors and overnight chaperones. The school district may elect to seek criminal history background checks for other volunteers, independent contractors, and student employees. Policy 413 Harassment and Violence

The purpose of this policy is to maintain a learning and working environment that is free from harassment and violence on the basis of race, color, creed, religion, national origin, sex, age, marital status, familial status, status with regard to public assistance, sexual orientation, or disability.

Policy 514 Bullying Prohibition Policy A safe and civil environment is needed for students to learn and attain high academic standards and to promote healthy human relationships. Bullying, like other violent or disruptive behavior, is conduct that interferes with a student's ability to learn and/or a teacher's ability to educate students in a safe environment. The school district cannot monitor the activities of students at all times and eliminate all incidents of bullying between students, particularly when students are not under the direct supervision of school personnel. However, to the extent such conduct affects the educational environment of the school district and the rights and welfare of its students and is within the control of the school district in its normal operations, the school district intends to prevent bullying and to take action to investigate, respond to, and to remedi-ate and discipline for those acts of bullying which have not been successfully prevented. The purpose of this policy is to assist the school district in its goal of preventing and responding to acts of bullying, intimidation, violence, reprisal, retaliation, and other similar disruptive and detrimental behavior. This policy meets the requirements of the 2014 bullying and safe schools

#### Policy 534 Unpaid Meal Charges

The purpose of this policy is to ensure that students receive healthy and nutritious meals through the school district's nutrition program. When a student's meal account reaches zero, a student may not charge further meals or a la carte items until the account has sufficient funds. The school district will make reasonable efforts to communicate with families to resolve the matter of meal account balances that are low or fall below zero. The school district may provide an alternate meal that meets federal and state requirements to a student who does not have sufficient funds in the student's account or cannot pay cash for a meal. Families will be notified of a low balance once the balance reaches \$20.00. Negative balances of -\$20.00 may be turned over for collection. Policies are available for review at the District Office.

#### Watch for Breckenridge School Referendum Information

The Board of Education for Breckenridge Public School voted to hold a referendum on November 2. The ballot will include three questions, one to increase the operating levy, and two bond questions to address aging school facilities.

For the last several years, the school district has led a process that included a facilities analysis, a community task force, community meetings, a public opinion survey, and a great many meetings by the school board to discern the right approach to address aging school facilities.

The school board is considering a facilities option most strongly supported by community members in a public opinion survey. In the survey, community members favored a new pre-kindergarten through grade 12 campus on a new site with a community center over three other options.
